influenced by erika lindemann s a rhetoric for writing teachers a rhetoric for writing program administrators delineates the major issues and questions in the field of writing program administration and provides readers new to that field with theoretical lenses through which to view those issues and questions in brief and direct though not oversimplified chapters a rhetoric for writing program administrators explains the historical and theoretical background of such concepts as academic freedom first year composition basic writing writing across the curriculum placement esl general education and transfer its thirty nine contributors are seasoned writing program and center administrators who in a range of voices map the discipline of writing program administration and guide readers toward finding their own answers to solving problems at their own institutions

concerned with both the nature and the practice of discourse the eighteen essays collected here treat rhetoric as a dynamic enterprise of inquiry exploration and application and in doing so reflect james I kinneavy s firm belief in the vital relationship between theory and practice his commitment to a spirit of accommodation and assimilation that promotes the development of ever more powerful theories and ever more useful practices a thorough introduction

provides the reader with clear summaries of the essays by leading edge theorists researchers and teachers of writing and rhetoric a field context for the ideas presented in this book is provided through the division of the various chapters into four major sections that focus on classical rhetoric and rhetorical theory in historical contexts on dimensions of discourse theory aspects of discourse communities and the sorts of knowledge people access and use in producing written texts on writing in school related contexts and on several dimensions of nonacademic writing a fifth section contains a bibliographic survey and an appreciation of james kinneavy s work the exceptional range of these essays makes a rhetoric of doing an ecumenical examination of the current state of mind in rhetoric and written communication a survey and description of what discourse and those in the field of discourse are in fact doing

this book presents an in depth analysis of language s role as the tool and environment for human survival on earth examining its ability to provide an unlimited space for telling individual stories that bear the knowledge of mankind s self significance the book is the result of a 20 year long composite study of language phenomenology grounded in the interactions of bulgarian and english approached in a game like fashion where the play with language units transcends levels of meanings based on significances and explored through the four basic avatars of activated language the learner the teacher the translator and the creator of texts the book is divided into three sections the first details the motivation for this study and the design of the method of exploration this is followed by an application of this method to the talkative web in order to find ways of meeting the enormous demand for human content the final section brings together the colourful practices of activated language movement this book is not about the philosophy of language per se it is concerned with the practical field beyond the philosophy of language where the self identification of the subject is brought to a higher stage of communicative creativity the rhetoric theory of argumentation is argued throughout the book to be the relevant ground for building a holistic tool of language learning where language acquisition is seen as the capability of the subject to construct worlds in a universe whose leading structure involves the rhetoric criteria of ethos pathos and logos on the one hand and the self identifying choice of meanings to situations of complex nature on the other as such the book is primarily concerned with linguistics rhetoric semiotics of culture ethics and language learning viewed through a philosophical preoccupation with humanity

rhetoric has traditionally studied acts of persuasion in the affairs of government and men but this work investigates the language of other non traditional rhetors including immigrants women urban children and others who have long been on the margins of civic life and political forums

undertaken by one of the most learned and visionary scholars in the field this work has a comprehensive and culminating quality to it tracking major lines of insight into writing as a human practice and articulating the author s intellectual progress as a theorist and researcher across a career

religious toleration is much discussed these days but where did the western notion of toleration come from in this thought provoking book gary remer traces arguments for religious toleration back to the renaissance demonstrating how humanist thinkers initiated an intellectual tradition that has persisted even to our present day although toleration has long been recognized as an important theme in renaissance humanist thinking many scholars have mistakenly portrayed the humanists as proto englightenment rationalists and nascent liberals remer however offers the surprising conclusion that humanist thinking on toleration was actually founded on the classical tradition of rhetoric it was the rhetorician's commitment to decorum the ability to argue both sides of an issue and the

search for an acceptable epistemological standard in probability and consensus that grounded humanist arguments for toleration remer also finds that the primary humanist model for a full fledged theory of toleration was the ciceronian rhetorical category of sermo conversation the historical scope of this book is wide ranging remer begins by focusing on the works of four humanists desiderius erasmus jacobus acontius william chillingworth and jean bodin then he considers the challenge posed to the humanist defense of toleration by thomas hobbes and pierre bayle finally he shows how humanist ideas have continued to influence arguments for toleration even after the passing of humanism from john locke to contemporary american discussions of freedom of speech

in the first book to systematically deal with daoism taoism from a rhetorical perspective author steven c combs advances the idea that the works of daoist taoist sages laozi lao tzu zhuangzi chuang tzu and sunzi sun tzu can be fused into a coherent rhetorical genre which can then form a methodology for rhetorical criticism this notion of daoist rhetoric enables critics to examine discourse from new vantage points with novel processes and concepts that honor the creativity and complexity of human communication combs also critically examines four contemporary films the tao of steve a bug s life antz and shrek to amplify rhetorical daoism to indicate clear differences between western and daoist values and to offer fresh perspectives on individuals and social action the book argues that daoism provides a lens for viewing limitations of current western rhetorical theorizing positioning daoist rhetoric as a potent critical perspective in the contemporary postmodern world

analyses the rhetoric of dissidents outsiders and truth tellers to challenge preconceptions about free speech and political criticism in the early middle ages

the age of information has spawned a critical focus on human communication in a multimedia world particularly on theories and practices of writing with the worldwide web impacting increasingly on academic and business communication the need has never been greater for advanced study in writing communication and critical thinking across all genres sectors and cultures in recent decades the definitions of new rhetoric have expanded to encompass a variety of theories and movements raising the question of how rhetoric is understood and employed in the twenty first century the essays collected here represent variations on these themes with each attempting to answer the title s deliberately provocative question addressing particularly how the classical art of rhetoric is still relevant today how it is directly related to modern technologies and the new modes of communication they have generated how rhetorical practice is informing research methodologies and teaching and learning practices in the contemporary academy

through close analysis of texts cultural and civic communities and intellectual history the papers in this collection for the first time propose a dynamic relationship between rhetoric and medicine as discourses and disciplines of cure in early modern europe although the range of theoretical approaches and methodologies represented here is diverse the essays collectively explore the theories and practices innovations and interventions that underwrite the shared concerns of medicine moral philosophy and rhetoric care and consolation reading policy and rectitude signinference selfhood and autonomy all developed and refined at the intersection of areas of inquiry usually thought distinct from italy to england from the sixteenth through to the mid eighteenth century early

modern moral philosophers and essayists rhetoricians and physicians investigated the passions and persuasion vulnerability and volubility theoretical intervention and practical therapy in the dramas narratives and disciplines of public and private cure the essays are relevant to a wide range of readers including cultural literary and intellectual historians of medicine and philosophy and scholars of rhetoric

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challenges the traditional rhetorical canon

rhetoric broadly conceived as the art of making things matter is both a practice and theory about that practice in recent decades scholars of rhetoric have turned to approaches that braid together poetics performance and philosophy into a practical art by practical art they mean methods tested in practice by trial and error with a goal of offering something useful and teachable this volume presents just such an account of rhetoric the account here does not turn away from theory but rather presumes and incorporates theoretical approaches offering a collection of principles assembled in the heat and trials of public practice the approaches ventured in this volume are inspired by the capacious conception of rhetoric put forth by historian of rhetoric jeffrey walker who is perhaps best known for stressing rhetoric s educational mission and its contributions to civic life the practice of rhetoric is organized into three sections designed to spotlight in turn the importance of poetics performance and philosophy in rhetorical practice the volume begins with poetics stressing the world making properties of that word in contexts ranging from mouse infested medieval fields to the threat of toxin ridden streams in the mid twentieth century susan c jarratt for instance probes the art of ekphrasis or vivid description and its capacity for rendering alternative futures michele kennerly explores a little studied linguistic predecessor to prose logos psilos or naked speech exposing the early rumblings of a separation between poetic and rhetorical texts even as it historicizes the idea of clothed or ornamented speech in an essay on the almost magical properties of writing debra hawhee considers the curious practice of people writing letters to animals in order to banish or punish them thereby casting the epistolary arts in a new light part 2 moves to performance vessela valiavitcharska examines the intertwining of poetic rhythm and performance in byzantine rhetorical education and how such practices underlie the very foundations of oratory dale martin smith draws on the ancient stylistic theory of dionysius of halicarnassus along with the activist work of contemporary poets amiri baraka and harmony holiday to show how performance and persuasion unify rhetoric and poetics most treatments of philosophy and rhetoric begin within a philosophical framework and remain there focusing on old tools like stasis and disputation essays in part 3 break out of that mold by focusing on the utility and teachability of rhetorical principles in education jeanne fahnestock and marie secor update stasis a classical framework that encourages aspiring rhetors to ask after the nature of things their facts and their qualities as a way of locating an argument s position mark garrett longaker probes the medieval practice of disputation in order to marshal a new argument about why exactly john locke detested rhetoric and the longstanding opposition between science and rhetoric as modes of proof that has lasting implications for the way argument works today ranging across centuries and contexts the essays collected here demonstrate the continued need to attend carefully to the co-operation of descriptive language and normative reality conceptual vocabulary and material practice public speech and moral self shaping the volume promises to rekindle long standing conversations about the public world making practice of rhetoric thereby enlivening anew its civic mission

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to provide a view of the history of western rhetoric this volume presents original articles by a number of world renowned scholars representing different countries and varying viewpoints in discussing the status of the historical perspectives on rhetoric these international scholars also present a tribute to james j murphy whose scholarship and service did much to shape the field the book will introduce new insights into western european rhetoric and its connections with english rhetoric

this text is a representative sample of my research focus in contemporary rhetoric since the mid 1970s it highlights work that explores themes expressed in the text s title while not an exhaustive account of the themes the text provides easy access to theoretical issues in rhetorical studies these include topics such as the role of culture citizenship how space and time interact to affect the words we use and the impulse to use language in critiquing the expressions of others the collection is designed to be used by faculty teaching upper level undergraduate to doctoral level courses in rhetoric at colleges and universities in the usa it also will be a resource at universities across the globe the goal is to stimulate thought and provoke critical responses to the ideas and arguments contained in the essays thus this is a text to be used to assist scholars and students as they engage in their own work

a landmark volume that explores the interconnected nature of technologies and rhetorical practice rhetorical machines addresses new approaches to studying computational processes within the growing field of digital rhetoric while computational code is often seen as value neutral and mechanical this volume explores the underlying and often unexamined modes of persuasion this code engages in so doing it argues that computation is in fact rife with the values of those who create it and thus has powerful ethical and moral implications from socrates s critique of writing in plato s phaedrus to emerging new media and internet culture the scholars assembled here provide insight into how computation and rhetoric work together to produce social and cultural effects this multidisciplinary volume features contributions from scholar practitioners across the fields of rhetoric computer science and writing studies it is divided into four main sections emergent machines examines how technologies and algorithms are framed and entangled in rhetorical processes operational codes explores how computational processes are used to achieve rhetorical ends ethical decisions and moral protocols considers the ethical implications involved in designing software and that software s impact on computational culture and the final section includes two scholars responses to the preceding chapters three of the sections are prefaced by brief conversations with chatbots autonomous computational agents addressing some of the primary questions raised in each section at the heart of these essays is a call for emerging and established scholars in a vast array of fields to reach interdisciplinary understandings of human machine interactions this innovative work will be valuable to scholars and students in a variety of disciplines including but not limited to rhetoric computer science writing studies and the digital humanities

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
